



Dear Sponsors,

I've just returned from Armenia. This country has experienced dark times since the annexation of the Nagorno-Karabakh region by Azerbaijan. A feeling of both incomprehension and anger overcame the people, just as their patriotic duty to welcome the announced 120,000 Karabaghtsi was to be fulfilled. These families arrive with nothing, some with only their papers and the clothes on their backs. However, they arrived in Armenian towns and villages with stories that were difficult to hear: the dead at the battlefronts and the people still hiding in the forests, the prisoners of war believed to be in Baku, nine months of blockade, hunger, cold, hours spent in the cellars of houses under the threat of bombs, and finally the three-day exodus at the end of September, with the death of the most vulnerable abandoned by the roadside.

The Armenians live to the rhythm of the arrivals and the generosity of these people towards their own kind is never-ending. However, the recent defeat at the hands of the Azeris, blamed in part on Armenia's Prime Minister, Mr Pachinian, and the misunderstandings about the countries allied to this region, have left Armenians increasingly uncertain about the future of their country.

Nevertheless, young people continue to study at university despite the high cost of living, particularly in the capital Yerevan. Children are attending school and pursuing their education and, for those who can, their extra-curricular activities, with great assiduity. Families are struggling to meet their most basic needs as a result of the price inflation affecting the country. With the onset of winter, with temperatures approaching -10°C, many of them will not be able to afford heating.

In the midst of this general instability, education is an anchor for those who are finding a new home and the assurance of a more serene life for all. Mission Enfance, thanks to its sponsors and the collaboration of its invaluable partners, ensures that this path to school is accessible to as many people as possible.

At the Boghossian centre, the residents, aged between 3 and 17, are cared for in an environment that fully meets their needs. From school to extra-curricular activities, from three meals a day to their wardrobe, the children lack for nothing. The Sisters of

the Congregation and the educators provide daily care for these children, whose dramatic family situation is painful. The atmosphere in the centre is joyful and helps to eclipse somewhat the past of a neglected childhood. There are currently 13 boarders. 15 other children join them at the centre every day to benefit from schooling, meals and extracurricular activities before going home to spend the night. Around twenty other children, including university students, are looked after by the sisters, and receive food and clothing support in addition to their sponsorship.

The centre helps many displaced families from Nagorno-Karabakh. The children are welcomed and benefit from all the activities on offer, as well as meals. The congregation houses the

most vulnerable families in flats near the centre. Their mission is essential to this community, and above all, to these children. Mission Enfance supports the congregation with emergency aid to help accommodate the many families who knock on their door every day.

In the morning, 250 students follow a wide range of state-recognised vocational training courses at the Endanik centre. They all benefit from a free canteen. 86 students graduated last year and are progressively entering the world of work. In the afternoon, 1,500 children take turns in the 37 workshops on offer: languages, embroidery, tapestry, jewellery, radio electronics, singing, dancing and so on.

The sponsored children excel in many fields. Their countless victories in national championships in karate, chess and wrestling are testimony to this. The many prizes won in cooking, drawing and painting competitions are further proof. The singers, dancers and musicians practise every day of the week to perfect their talent. The centre is very proud of them, and the rolls of honour, prizes and certificates are displayed in the entrance hall.
